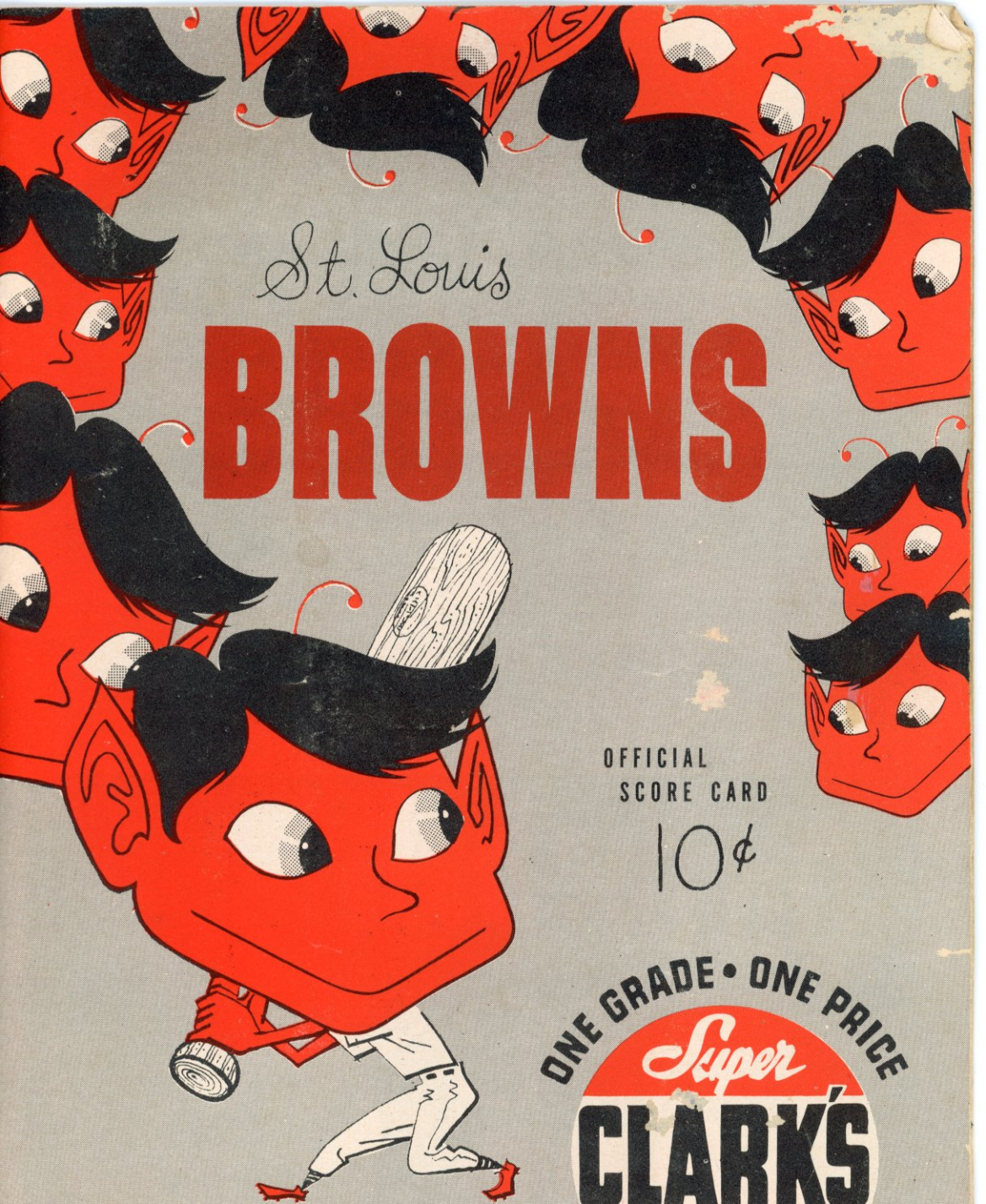

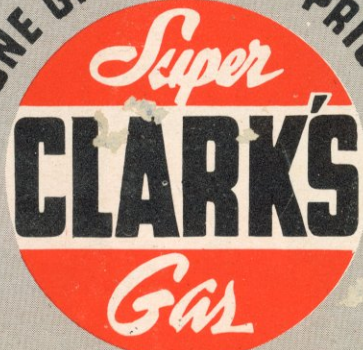

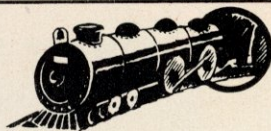

Ned Garver's tough luck continued through the early series on the Browns' second swing east when his teammates failed to get a run while he was hurling against Philadelphia. He had pitched 42 consecutive innings without a run in support. Meanwhile his earned run average was a creditable 3.63, lower by .10 points than his mark of a year ago when he won 20 games.

Bill Veeck's fantastic speaking pace continues this month with an average of 12 luncheon, dinner or evening meetings a week while the club is on the road and about seven a week when the Browns are home. Bill is booked heavily during 1952 and has engagements up to next May.

The American League this year is enforcing a rule prohibiting ball players from autographing while on the field or conversing with fans or opposing players. Players will be fined for violations. Browns' fans are urged to cooperate with this league prohibition and with the rule against fans entering the playing field.

St. Louis Browns pencils now carry convenient clips, each with the photo of a Browns' player printed on the face. And both the pencil and clip together sell at ball games for 10 cents. . . The new public address system now in use by the Browns is directed at giving better and more uniform coverage to fans in all areas of the park. It is operated from the press box so that controversial and other special information can be given to fans in attendance.

When the Browns return home from their long July road trip, they will face every other club in the league at home. Feature of the home stand will be a three-day weekend with the World Champion New York Yankees, including a night game Friday, August 1, a Ladies' Day game on Saturday, Aug. 2 and a big Sunday doubleheader on the third.

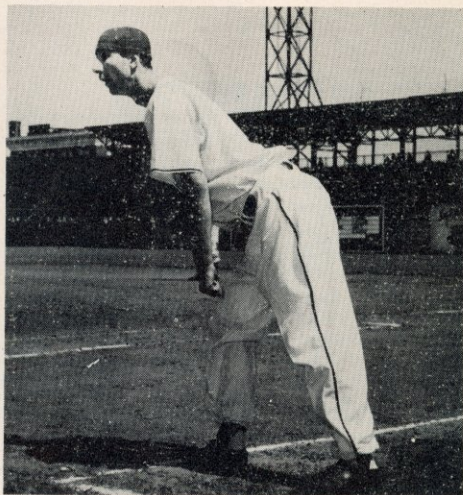

Two of baseball's greatest entertainers, both specialists in their field, will perform during the Browns' June home stand. Max Patkin, contortionist and comedian, will return to Sportsman's Park on Sunday, June 22 during the doubleheader between the Browns and the Washington Senators. Patkin, of course, will be remembered for his sensationally funny performances last August and September when he served as a Browns' coach.

Jackie Price, a one-man acrobatic show, is considered baseball's outstanding entertainer. In his repertoire are some amazing maneuvers, including acrobatic stunts and tricks with a baseball and bat. His appearance at Sportsman's Park on Saturday night, June 28, when the Browns meet the Detroit Tigers, will be Jackie's first solo performance in St. Louis. Both Price and Patkin were star performers in Bill Veeck's baseball galaxy in Cleveland in the late 1940's.

**PAIGE AND MADISON . . .
WHAT A RELIEF!**

Incredible relief hurling by venerable Satchel Paige and the surprising Dave Madison have given the Browns baseball's most reliable bull pen brigade.

As of June 4, ancient Satch and newcomer Dave had posted a combined earned run average of 1.76 in 51½ innings. Like a fine wine, Paige seems to improve with age. Reportedly the greatest hurler in Negro baseball a quarter century ago, today Satchmo is the American League's ace reliever. He is being boomed for a spot on the 1952 All-Star team. "There should be no doubt about it," says Bill Veeck. In his first 13 appearances, Satch hurled 28⅓ innings, yielding only six earned runs and 20 hits and posting a 1.92 ERA. In this span, Leroy won five and dropped one to rank among the league's top pitchers even without starting a game. His wins have been consecutive.

Madison, obtained from the New York Yankees on waivers, is a service returnee and is the 26th man on the Browns' roster. But he's more than won his spurs with his great clutch pitching. The former Army officer yielded only a dozen hits in his first 23 innings on the mound and four earned runs for a 1.56 ERA.

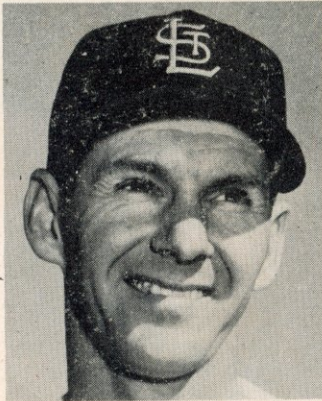

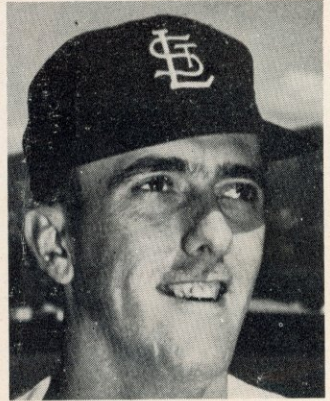

In Marty Marion and Bobby Young, the Browns have developed the best double play combination in their history. Individually both Marion and Young have excelled on defense this spring and early summer and they have formed a smooth working combination around second that has contributed mightily to the fine record of Brownie hurlers to date. As of June 6, the Browns were leading both major leagues in double plays with 63. This pace, if continued, would put the major league double play mark of 217 in jeopardy. The Athletics performed the record breaking feat in 1949.

BROWNS ON ALL-STAR TEAM? HERE'S YOUR CHANCE TO VOTE

Marty Marion, Bobby Young, Bob Nieman and Jim Delsing are expected to lead the Browns in balloting when All-Star team selections are made by the fans this month.

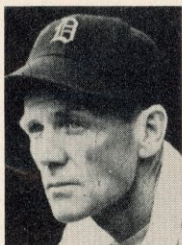
