
VR. AND MRS. LEVI W. BENSON OBSERVE 50TH ANNIVERSARY

Mr. and Mrs. Benson are products of the south and of the far north, Mrs. Benson being a native of Frederickton, N. B., and Mr. Benson of Norfolk, Va. He is 72 years of age and Mrs. Benson is 70 years. They were married in Tiltonville, in Plymouth, by Rev. Mr. Tewksbury and were residents during their early married life of Plymouth, and later for some years in the town of Kingston. Mr. Benson was in business most of the time as a hotel man or restaurant owner.

From Kingston they removed to Whitman where for five years Mr. Benson conducted the well-known Whitman House, and also conducted a restaurant in Abington. From there they came to Bryantville, 29 years ago, and have since made their

home here.

Mr. Benson established and for years conducted the well-known Benson's Cafe here and when he retired from active business several years ago, he sold Benson's Cafe to his son, Merle C. Benson, who has since conducted it. Mr. Benson, during late years, has been in the real estate business, handling much of the summer cottage business at the ponds here.

He has always been interested in town affairs though never holding town office, his only public work being as an official at the voting polls on town meeting days where he has officiated for many years. He is a member of Julius C. Monroe Camp, S. of U. V., of Hanson.
